A Connection for Good

PHILANTHROPY. What picture comes to mind when you hear the word? Is it a grainy black and white image of Andrew Carnegie or John D. Rockefeller? Is it a glossy magazine profile of Bill and Melinda Gates or Warren Buffett?

Picture Amy Johnson: fitness instructor, mother of two, philanthropist. Or Lance Porter: dentist, lifelong Hot Springs resident, philanthropist.

Johnson, Porter and their colleagues on the Hot Springs Future Fund steering committee are partnering to build a giving circle for young professionals in their community. Members of this newly formed group pool their charitable dollars and meet to decide which causes and organizations they want to support with their shared funds.

“Most people my age don’t have \$10,000 lying around to start an endowment of their own,” explained Porter. “I like the concept of being able to take the pooled membership dues and bring them together to build an endowment.”

Johnson echoed, “This group appeals to 20-, 30- and 40-year olds who are in the middle of raising families, working 40 hours a week and living on tight budgets.”

Group members are discovering that the Hot Springs Future Fund is less about their financial contributions than about their long-term support for the community. Because membership dues are invested in a permanent endowment, the money they contribute now in their 20s and 30s will continue to grow and benefit Hot Springs when their children and grandchildren are in their 20s and 30s.

That means membership is not only a commitment to Hot Springs, it’s also a commitment to each other, as members come together to make grants from their endowment every year. “Our mission isn’t just to raise money. We also want to engage a younger generation of givers and educate them about what an endowment is — what philanthropy is,” said Porter.

Across the state, people are partnering with Arkansas Community Foundation to build giving circles in their own communities. Whether they seek to build new relationships with others who share their charitable interests or solidify existing friendships through the bond of giving, these everyday philanthropists recognize that giving is most effective when we work together and unite behind common causes.

Giving circles are just one way Arkansas Community Foundation engages people, connects resources and inspires solutions to build our state’s communities.

A Bite Out of Childhood Poverty

If left untreated, a small cavity can grow into a searing toothache that distracts you from your schoolwork and makes it painful to eat. Tooth decay and discoloration can make you a target for unkind words and stares.

This summer, a group of Carroll County volunteers campaigned to bring the Ronald McDonald Care Mobile, for which Arkansas Children's Hospital serves as the clinical service provider, to Eureka Springs Elementary School to put smiles back on the faces of a few dozen local kids in need of dental treatment.

You've never seen a happier dental clinic: shiny new instruments, sparkling white surfaces, colorful cartoon decals on the walls, children's movies playing on televisions mounted above each dental chair. As the kids climbed the steps into the Care Mobile and were greeted by a smiling dentist and dental assistant, their curiosity about this unusual clinic on a bus melted their apprehension.

Recruiting the Care Mobile to visit Eureka Springs was a tangible sign of progress from a brand new Carroll County group working to address childhood poverty. Originating with a group of board members at **ARCF's Carroll County Community Foundation (CCCCF)** local office, CLIP (Children Living in Promise) emerged when a report published by the University of Arkansas in 2008 revealed some troubling figures for Carroll County.

"The study indicated that 35 percent of the families in Carroll County lived at or below 200 percent of the federal poverty level, and more than 20 percent of our children were living in poverty," said CCCF Executive Director Glenn Williams. As one of the sponsors of the study, CCCF organized several meetings to bring community leaders together to discuss how they could partner to address this need.

"We thought we'd be lucky if four or five of the people we invited showed up for the first meeting," said Williams. "I think 27 actually showed up." At the next meeting, 31 people came. The conversations ranged from foster parenting to mental healthcare for teens to the lack of transportation to get children to the services they need.

"We realized that the service providers are so busy with their frontline jobs that they don't have very much time to come together to communicate with each other, and sometimes even *they* don't know who is providing what services out there," explained CCCF Board Chair Sharon Spurlin.

The group recognized that before they could move forward, they needed to take stock of where things currently stood. "We didn't know what specific issues we were going to try to tackle, and we didn't want to duplicate resources that were already there," noted Williams.

As they worked on creating a guide to Carroll County services for children and families, they began to look for small ways to start taking action. They learned that because of a lack of foster families in the county, local children had to be sent to homes in other counties far from their schools, friends and relatives. So CLIP members hung signs, sent press releases and began inviting people to attend interest meetings about foster care. Five families attended the first meeting, even more attended the next one and the buzz has continued to grow.

Next, they learned about the Ronald McDonald Care Mobile and determined to bring those services to their community. Now they're beginning to seek larger, systemic ways to take action by examining their community's transportation needs and building partnerships among government and nonprofit service providers.

Members of the CLIP committee agree that if they're going to create meaningful change for children in Carroll County, everyone has to work together. "We've never intended for this to be the community foundation's project alone," said Sharon Spurlin. "We wanted to initiate a countywide discussion."

A Makeover for Marianna

It's not just a change of hair color and shaped eyebrows for the town of Marianna. A new spirit of change, a force for renewal, is being voiced and acted upon by citizens of this 140-year-old Delta town.

Back in 2007 more than 100 townspeople came together in a series of meetings to create a plan for the revitalization of Marianna, according to Andy Saavedra, program officer for Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC). LISC facilitated the town meetings and provided seed funding to bring in a project manager to implement the strategic plan for revitalization.

That project manager is Tamika Hull, a native of the community of Rondo, just eight miles south of Marianna. Hull was a field military police officer in the Middle East, Asia and Europe during her 10-year stint in the U.S. Army. She worked in real estate and community development in Madison, Wisconsin, and Chicago before moving back to Arkansas to be near her mother.

Since the plan had been written for more than a year, Hull's first action after she came to Marianna in December of 2009 was to pull together the members of the existing Marianna Revitalization Council, representing people from throughout the city. "I had the first meeting last January to get a feel for what they wanted to accomplish and where they wanted to start," she said.

Then she worked to secure the funding needed to make the Marianna Revitalization Project a reality. **Hull applied for one of the first Arkansas Delta Endowment for Building Community grants, an Arkansas Community Foundation initiative funded by the Kellogg Foundation.**

Using the Lee County Family Resource Center as the fiscal agent, the Marianna Revitalization Project received a \$15,000 Delta Endowment grant in the spring of 2010. Those funds were immediately put to work.

Activities already underway or completed in Marianna include community cleanup, revitalization of Atkins Park, a homebuyers fair and classes on financial literacy, initial steps toward establishing a new Boys and Girls Club, the Living Legends project that brings back famous citizens to speak with school children and a six-week Freedom School summer education program.

"We had 70 scholars in grades K through 8 at Freedom School this summer," said local consultant Renee Wilburn. "This literacy-based program was a great success."

One essential piece in the community revitalization is community cleanup, which builds pride and engages community volunteers. Hull enlisted Connie Muqtasid, the city's code enforcer, and her assistant Joe Louis Patterson, a long-time community leader, to help determine the most important cleanup projects.

"We identify properties to clean up and choose which elderly people to assist with their yards," Muqtasid said. "It is amazing to see some of the before and after photos — I feel we are really accomplishing something with this cleanup, and there's a great need here."

Then, knowing funds are limited and there are many projects to tackle, Hull contacted Brickeys, a nearby state prison facility, to see if inmates might help with cleanup work. Inmates were soon enlisted to help beautify area properties, and local businesses helped provide food during the cleanup.

Because much of the labor was pro bono, many more lots and lawns were able to be cleared and groomed. Grant funds were used for equipment, for the Living Legends program and for due diligence in finding a good location for the proposed Boys and Girls Club.

"It's wonderful to see the changes in our community," said Lois Boyd, Executive Director of the Lee County Family Resource Center, who has been back in her hometown for 10 years after a corporate career in Dallas. In addition to overseeing the financials, Boyd also has participated as a volunteer in some of the cleanup efforts and is a Revitalization Council member.

"Word is getting out that we are doing what we say we will do," Hull said. "The Marianna Revitalization Project has had good coverage from the local newspaper, and we are planning a newsletter that will go directly to community residents. Communication is essential to our collective efforts for revitalization."

More Feet on the Street

Today there are more ways than ever to deliver news and information. But first that news must be researched, gathered and reported. Our communities need professional reporters to seek and write, to begin the news. As Stuttgart *Daily Leader* General Manager John Kennedy says, “We need more feet on the street.”

A new program from Arkansas Community Foundation, the only one of its kind in the nation, is helping boost the reporting staff at community newspapers in Arkansas to increase in-depth coverage of community and economic development issues. The Write for Arkansas initiative, funded in part through a \$252,000 match grant from the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation, provides salaries for an additional fulltime reporting position at five community newspapers across the state.

ARCF partnered with the Arkansas Press Association, along with ARCF donors who have helped match the Knight Foundation grant, to increase the capacity of local newspapers to provide the in-depth coverage of local issues citizens need to make informed decisions and towns need to maintain a sense of community.

In addition, grant funds have been used to create writeforarkansas.org, a website where the five reporters’ stories are collected in a searchable archive and where the reporters regularly blog about their communities and experiences.

Publishers throughout the state submitted grant requests in the spring of 2010, and five newspapers were chosen to receive the grants. Areawide Media newspapers in Salem, the *Madison County Record* in Huntsville, *The Courier* in Russellville, the *Daily Leader* in Stuttgart and the *Texarkana Gazette* now have Write for Arkansas reporters on staff.

The *Daily Leader* publishes five times a week in the thriving town of Stuttgart, home to about 10,000 people in the heart of the Arkansas Delta. Lesley Valadez is managing editor of the newspaper which is celebrating its 125th year of publication.

“It is difficult with a small staff — you can only cover so much,” said Valadez. So she was excited to receive the Write for Arkansas grant to supplement her staff. Valadez used the newspaper’s website and other online recruiting tools to get the word out about her Write for Arkansas reporter position.

Sarah Morris, an Arkansas State University journalism graduate working at a newspaper in Stillwater, Oklahoma, saw the job posting on journalismjobs.com and went to the *Daily Leader* site to learn more.

“I love a challenge,” said Morris on her first day on the job. “This grant position for two years sounded like a challenge. I’m from Wynne, which is about the same size as Stuttgart, and this is a farming community, which I love. It’s close to Little Rock and I can still have the big-town experience when I want, and it’s close to my family.”

Valadez, a California native who has been in Stuttgart three years, said during her tenure coverage in the *Daily Leader* has focused on what’s going on in town. With the addition of Morris, she hopes to expand the number of stories that ask, “What do people here feel about what is happening?” “How does what is happening affect them?” and “What do they hope will happen with city and local government?”

Valadez is confident Morris can get the voice she is seeking into stories for the *Daily Leader*. “I was impressed with her clips from other newspapers and the way she brought human interest into stories she had been assigned,” she continued. “Sarah fits in like she’s been here a while already, so I see great things coming out of this situation.”

Creative Solutions to Arkansas's Needs

And to spearhead our efforts to generate solutions that will help build our communities, David Johnson has been hired as the Foundation's Vice President for Community Investment. In one major initiative, he is working with researchers at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock on a report that will give us an excellent, county-by-county look at community needs throughout the state.

Arkansas Community Foundation is a family of philanthropists, and our family includes you. 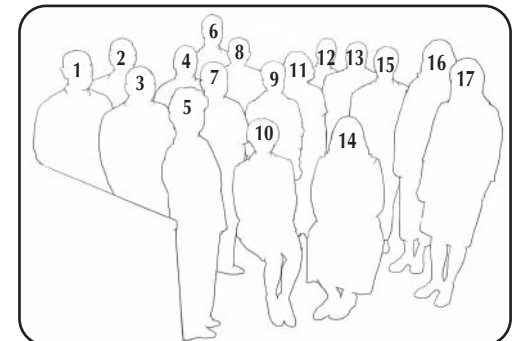

Our Mission

ARCF Grants Work for Good, for Arkansas, for Ever

Arkansas Community Foundation helps nonprofit organizations connect resources to create positive change in our state. Since 1976, we've made more than \$80 million in grants to causes ranging from animal welfare and environmental stewardship to economic development and hunger relief.

Competitive Grants

We offer several opportunities throughout the year for your organization to apply for ARCF grants.

- Our signature **Giving Tree grant program** supports a broad range of causes across our state, with grants made in each of our 27 affiliate areas.
- **Arkansas Black Hall of Fame Foundation grants** are geared toward projects serving African Americans and other minority populations.
- **Arkansas Delta Endowment for Building Community grants** target initiatives to improve the quality of life in 26 Delta counties.
- Our **Science Initiative for Middle Schools (SIMS)** provides minigrants to help middle school science teachers purchase materials for hands-on instruction.

Donor-Advised Grants

Many of our grants are recommended by the donors who establish endowments through ARCF. These donors may designate a particular charity to receive grants from their fund each year or may recommend new grant recipients periodically according to their current charitable interests.

Eligibility

We make grants in the areas of

- Animal Welfare
- Arts & Humanities
- Community Development
- Education
- Environment
- Health
- Human Services
- Religion

501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations, schools, hospitals, government agencies and other not-for-profit or charitable organizations are eligible to receive grants. The Foundation typically does not make grants to organizations that do not qualify for tax-exempt status, but we occasionally make exceptions if the proposed project has a clear charitable purpose for the public benefit. We do not make grants to individuals.

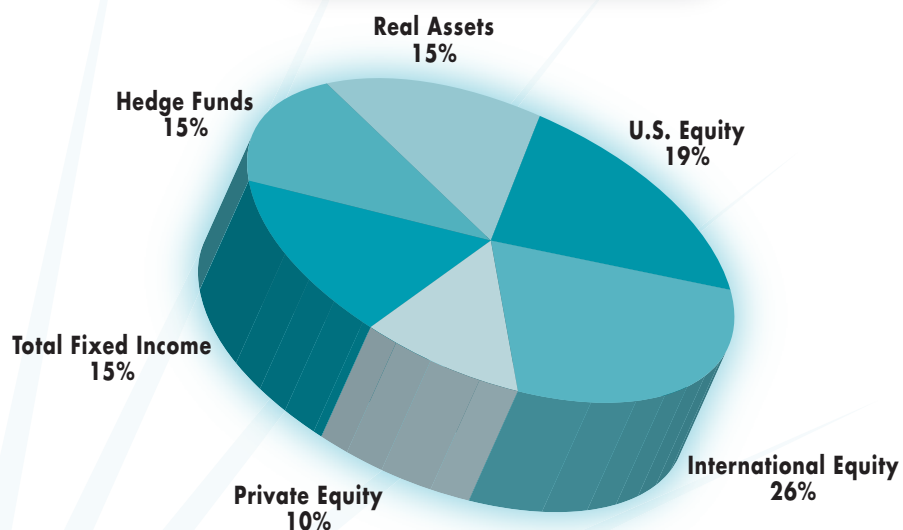

Financial Information

As stewards we strive to ensure that the charitable objectives of our donors will be met in perpetuity. We do this through prudent investment and spending practices. ARCF welcomed FY 2010 as a year of growth. Total assets reached \$121.9 million. Gifts received during 2010 exceeded \$10 million, and grant payments totaled \$8.8 million. ARCF's diversified investment allocation returned 11.3 percent, ahead of its composite index. The allocation at June 30, 2010 was comprised of 49.2 percent to equities, 23.6 percent to fixed income, 21.9 percent to alternative investments and 5.3 percent to cash equivalents.

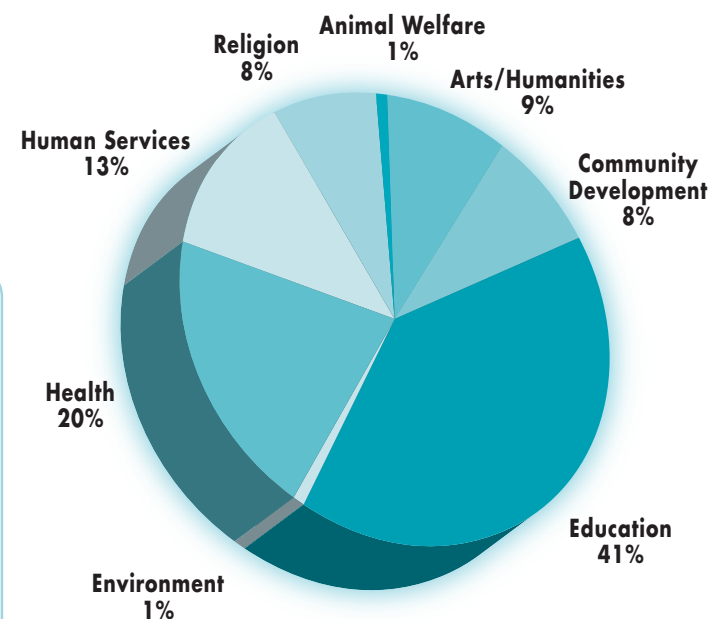

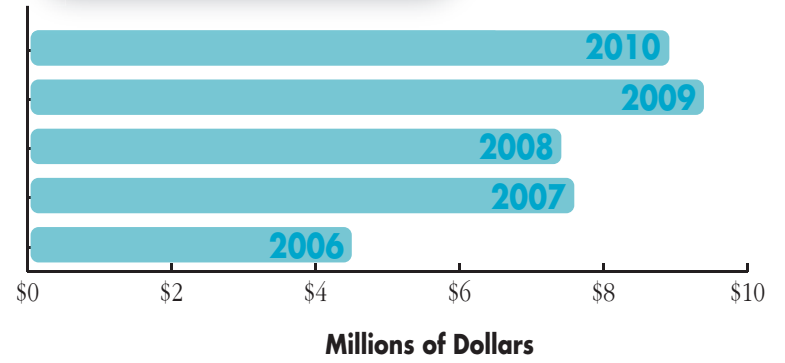

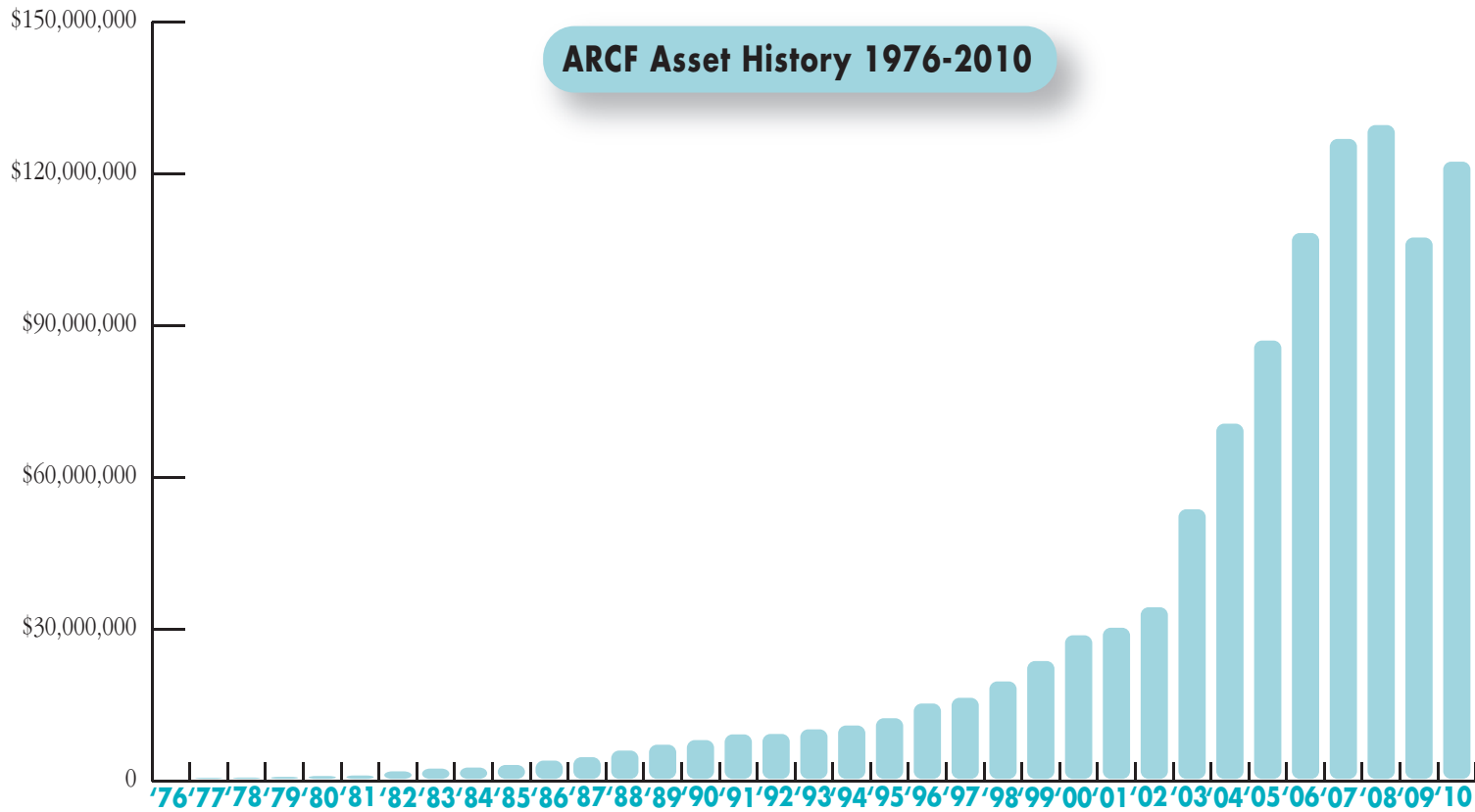
Five Year Gifts History

ARCF Asset History 1976-2010

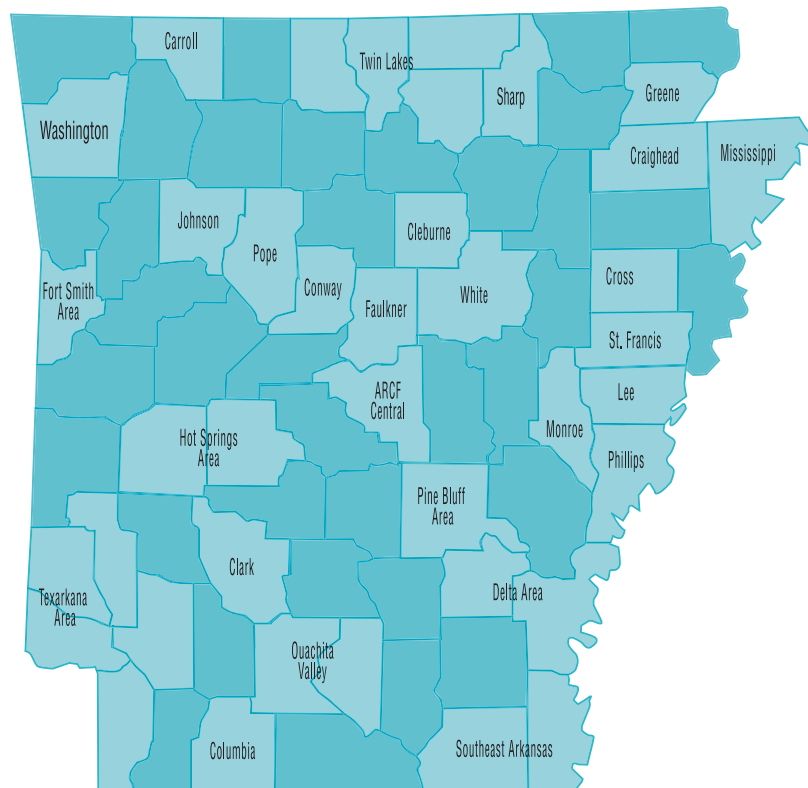


ARCF's Local Offices

Students Help Feed Hungry Families

Back in 2008 Clark County Community Foundation (CCCF) made a \$5,838 grant to the Southwest Arkansas Food Bank in Arkadelphia. When CCCF Executive Director Ginger Overturf told local board members the food bank was in dire need of volunteers in 2010, they decided to give more than money.

Daniels hopes other school districts will follow suit to provide all the volunteer labor the food bank needs. "Students can't learn if they don't have enough to eat. It is all tied back to feeding families."

Art Doors Beautify Downtown Park

Downtown Morrilton's new Broadway Pocket Park is part downtown revitalization effort, part economic development initiative and part art appreciation venue.

It started with the removal of an abandoned building. When the lot was cleared, it seemed that something was missing. So while the City Parks and Recreation Commission organized volunteers to convert the lot into a park, the Rialto Art Gallery in partnership with the Arts Council of Conway County devised a plan to create community art pieces that would make the park a downtown focal point.

Their idea, sparked by local real estate agent Susan Henderson, was to use metal doors as canvases for art murals painted by local children. With a grant from Conway County Community Foundation's Youth Advisory Council, project director Mollie Williams recruited the South Conway County School District's four schools to design and create the murals, which were debuted at the park's grand opening in June.

"The grand opening was a significant event for the city of Morrilton because it brought together various groups and individuals in the town to center on an appreciation of art in Conway County," explained Williams. By converting an abandoned lot into a downtown destination, the project's hundreds of supporters made a tangible, and artistic, difference in their community.

Organizing a Community to Fight Drug Abuse

It all started with a letter to the editor. About two years ago, attorney Charles "Skip" Mooney Jr. wrote a guest editorial in the *Jonesboro Sun* arguing that drug abuse isn't just the problem of individuals or families; it affects the health of the whole community. The community got the message, and when Mooney organized a meeting to discuss drug abuse in Craighead County, almost 300 people turned out.

From that meeting, the Out of the Dark organization was formed. Volunteers stood ready to serve, eight schools started Out of the Dark chapters to raise awareness and local civic groups contacted the organization to hear about its plans and how they could help. The momentum was there, and Craighead County Community Foundation (CCCF) helped provide the means to organize the groundswell of individual interest into a community movement.

CCCF's board members took an interest in the project and encouraged Out of the Dark to apply for nonprofit tax status so it could begin to raise funds. Next, CCCF assisted Out of the Dark in securing office space and convened leaders from Out of the Dark, Arkansas Community Foundation and Arkansas State University for a planning session.

Now, with a \$2,500 grant from CCCF to hire a facilitator for a strategic planning process, Out of the Dark is defining its goals and preparing to take action against drug abuse. "They're on the road, and we hope that our \$2,500 will give them a strategic plan," said CCCF Executive Director Barbara Weinstock.

Teens Lead Effort to Build Hunger Relief Endowment

The text messages and Facebook posts flew in triumph when the Endowment Foundation of Cross County's (EFCC) Youth Advisory Council reached its goal of raising \$10,000 to build a Stop Hunger Endowment, creating a new, permanent source of funding for hunger relief efforts in Cross County.

In 2009 an anonymous Arkansas Community Foundation donor challenged each of the Foundation's local offices to build \$10,000 hunger relief endowments by December 31; if they met the goal, they'd receive an additional grant of \$1 for every \$2 raised. While the challenge was originally issued to the local offices' board members, in Cross County the teens on the Youth Advisory Council (YAC) offered to take up the cause.

They were extremely excited and enthusiastic about the project," said YAC Advisor Debbie Meyer. Over the course of three months, the YACs wrote letters to friends and relatives, spoke to the local Rotary Club, asked for donations at their churches, took up collections at school and gained coverage in the local newspaper. With a grant from the EFCC board to push them over the edge, the YACs met their goal with time to spare.

"Those kids became aware of what can be done. It was an effort where projects were divided and delegated and carried out enthusiastically," said Meyer. "What an opportunity for the members of YAC to experience the generosity of our community!"

Sewing the Seeds of Economic Development

If the women and men who attend sewing skills classes at Reaching for Life Inc. in Star City are able to raise their income by \$500 per month, they can move from poverty to a better standard of living.

That's the idea behind a \$1,660 grant from Delta Area Community Foundation, one of 14 Giving Tree grants the ARCF local office awarded in the spring of 2010.

Experienced seamstress Detri McGhee sees this grant for sewing, quilting and alterations classes as a way for participants from Lincoln and Desha counties to supplement their income, utilize their creative spirit and learn from each other about how to make and market their products. McGhee envisions expanding the classes and establishing a training and marketing center in Star City.

The initial session of weekly classes were attended by about a dozen students aged 8 to 64. For their first projects, the students cut out, sewed and quilted squares that were sent to servicemen and women and taken to children at hospitals.

"The classes are open to children because it helps them to learn something constructive," McGhee explained. "Though some of the adults may only sew for themselves, others will be able to significantly increase their income."

Hunger Endowment a Slam Dunk

How do a Hunger Dragon, a Kiwanis Club announcement, a "Christingle" celebration and a school contest add up? In Faulkner County they totaled \$28,749 for hunger relief.

"The ARCF challenge grant to raise \$10,000 for a local hunger endowment by the end of calendar 2009 became our opportunity for community leadership," said Community Foundation of Faulkner County Executive Director Julie LaRue. Each member of the local board made a commitment to get at least three groups or businesses involved in raising money. They contacted dry cleaners, Sunday School classes, Boy Scout troops, restaurants and clubs to start an endowment that will help feed hungry people forever.

One board member's brief Kiwanis Club announcement netted \$5,100 from a local business and two individuals. A private school's Christingle holiday celebration raised approximately \$2,500.

Local magazine *501 Life* published photos of every school in the county that brought in \$400 for the endowment or food items for Bethlehem House homeless shelter. At one school, a Hunger Dragon's tail expanded again and again as hundreds of scales demonstrated the number of donations.

"It was a slam dunk for the whole community," said LaRue. "We've decided to make the hunger initiative an annual event in Faulkner County."

Challenge Grant Opens Doors for Senior Center

When the Fayetteville Senior Activity Center was forced to cut back Meals on Wheels deliveries and institute a waiting list for new clients, the news seemed grim. As it turned out, though, this temporary setback was just the jumpstart the Senior Center needed to rev up its fundraising efforts and build new partnerships, with a little help from Fayetteville Area Community Foundation (FACF).

Soon after the bad news broke, FACF Executive Director Kim Dutton got a call from an anonymous FACF donor who proposed a \$30,000 match grant to give the Center a fundraising boost.

Spurred to action by the donor's fundraising challenge, Dutton attended a training seminar for nonprofits along with the Senior Center's executive director, Sherri Napier. At the conference, Napier gained new fundraising ideas and soon organized a health fair for senior citizens, raising \$5,000 in booth fees that could be used to help restore Meals on Wheels service.

Dutton learned that Washington Regional Medical Center frequently referred patients to the Senior Center, so she contacted the hospital's foundation to share the news about the match challenge. They quickly responded with a \$15,000 donation, bringing the Senior Center more than halfway to its fundraising goal.

"Everyone's coming together," said Dutton. "It's been a really good experience. It's amazing how one person can start the ball rolling and everyone jumps in to help. The Senior Center director is happy because she can start pulling clients off the waiting list, and the donor knows that they truly made a difference."

Giving Circle Creates Solutions

The members of the Greene County 21st Century Women's Giving Circle at the Endowment Foundation of Greene County (EFGC) are hitting their stride as philanthropists. New Downtown Facility Contributes to Community Development

Johnson County Community Foundation (JCCF) made its largest Giving Tree grant ever this year — \$3,000 for new clothing racks and shelving at the Mustard Seed Thrift Store's new downtown location. "Our board recognizes the service the Mustard Seed does in our community," said JCCF Board Chair Melody Reasoner.

Challenge Grant Helps Feed Students

"This grant makes it possible for the Women's Club to plan and execute activities to improve overall social and academic skills."

Training sessions on manners and etiquette presented at the historic Pillow-Thompson House in Helena teach youth about the history of Phillips County and the lives of early citizens, as well as social graces.

Youth club members are trained to use their talents in speaking, singing and dancing competitively. They visit area nursing homes, make quilts to donate to babies with AIDS and work with the Healthy Phillips County Vegetable Garden Project for promotion of healthy eating by planting and growing fresh vegetables for the community.

Museum Preserves History and Expands for Future

From vacant building to downtown anchor – the Two Rivers Museum is transforming a corner of Main Street in Ashdown.

In 2005, the Little River County Historical Society realized its collection of artifacts was outgrowing its present location, so the group scouted a new site and decided on an unused building on the corner of Main Street and Constitution Avenue.

"The progress has been incredible," said Stuart Daniels, executive director of Texarkana Area Community Foundation (TACF). With ongoing grant support from TACF and contributions from a successful annual fundraiser, the Historical Society has renovated the building, established new exhibits and even purchased a second adjoining building to accommodate future growth.

"They've done an excellent job of preserving the historic character of the building," noted Daniels. Operating with no paid museum staff, the Historical Society has not only established a space where residents of Southwest Arkansas can come to experience history but is also contributing to the vitality of Ashdown's downtown.

"When you look at community leadership, I don't know any organization that fits the mold better than that," said Daniels.

Fighting Hunger, \$80 at a Time

This year Twin Lakes Community Foundation (TLCF) made hunger a community concern.

With \$6,400 left to raise to reach their goal of

\$10,000 for a hunger relief endowment, they decided to break the task into bite-size pieces.

"We needed 80 people to donate \$80. We wanted to break it down into an obtainable goal," explained Executive Director Janice Fletcher.

Community members responded to the challenge with open hearts and pocketbooks. "Our board members announced our campaign at their civic club meetings. Often, club members would pull out their checkbooks and write an \$80 check on the spot," Fletcher said.

Each month, TLCF used its regular radio segment on local station KTLO to report progress and announce how many more \$80 donations were needed to reach the goal. When coupled with stories of local hunger relief programs that benefit from the new endowment, these on-air appeals helped bring in donations in record time. And in fact, the endowment soon grew to more than \$16,000 in contributions, plus an additional \$5,000 in matching funds from an anonymous donor – more than twice the original fundraising goal.

"The Twin Lakes area is an incredibly giving community — folks always step up when there is a real need in our area," said Fletcher.

Day of Caring Evolves to Meet Changing Community Needs

White County's Day of Caring started in 1994 as an immunization clinic for children, but it wasn't long before additional services began to be tacked on. By 1997, the event had grown to include medical, dental and vision services for uninsured and underinsured residents of all ages.

Beyond the estimated 1,600 residents who received health services, haircuts, school supplies, food, personal care items and clothing at this year's Day of Caring, hundreds of others were touched by the event when they donated items or volunteered to staff booths, provided medical services or even interpreted for non-English-speaking residents.

"This isn't just a one organization, one purpose event," noted Kathy Murphy, executive director of White County Community Foundation (WCCF). "We look at the Day of Caring as something that has evolved to serve the changing needs of community members, not only from a medical standpoint but also human services."

This year, WCCF supported the Day of Caring with a Giving Tree grant for the purchase of food to be distributed to attendees.

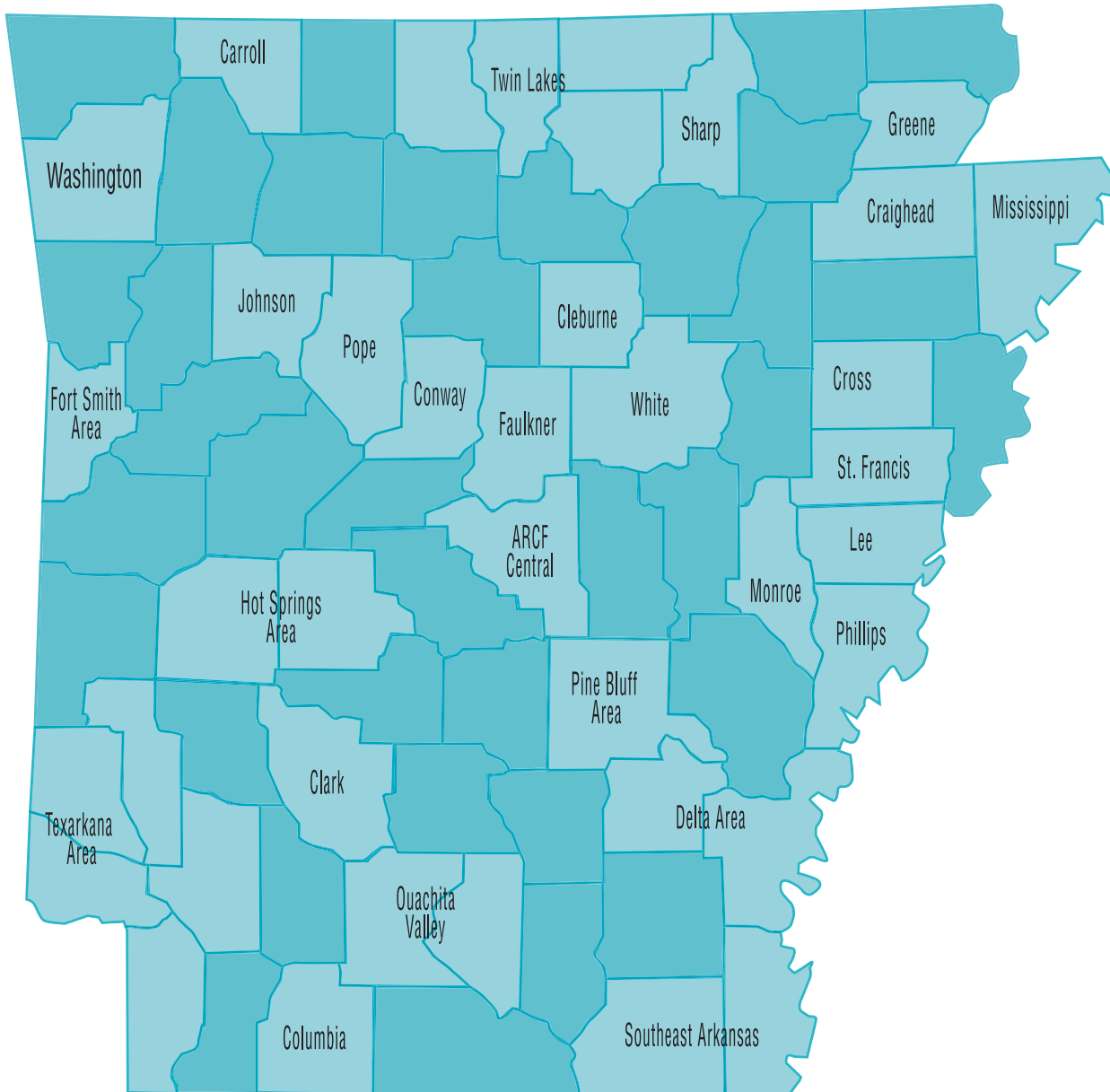
